

Purpose of Sea Scouts

Sea Scouting is a specialized segment of the Venturing program organized to promote better citizenship and to improve members' boating skills and knowledge through instruction and practice in water safety, boating skills, outdoor, social, and service experiences, and knowledge of our maritime heritage.

Sea Scout units, called "ships," focus on sailing and cruising either sailboats or power vessels. During the boating seasons, Sea Scouts learn to maintain and operate their vessel, with a focus on learning the safe and proper methods of handling boats. Sea Scouts also learn the meaning of buoys and lights, how to take advantage of wind and tide, and how to drop anchor or approach a dock.

As a Sea Scout I promise to do my best: To guard against water accidents; To know the location and proper use of the lifesaving devices on every boat I board; To be prepared to render aid to those in need; To seek to preserve the motto of the sea, Women and children first.

WILLIAM T. HORNADAY AWARD

The William T. Hornaday Award is the highest award in Scouting for distinguished service to natural resource conservation. This highly prized award recognizes truly outstanding efforts that have contributed significantly to conservation and environmental protection.

Purpose

The fundamental purpose of the Hornaday Awards program is to encourage learning by the participants and to increase public awareness about natural resource conservation. Understanding and practicing sound stewardship of natural resources and environmental protection strengthens Scouting's emphasis on respecting the outdoors. The goal of this awards program is to encourage and recognize truly outstanding efforts undertaken by Scouting units, Scouts and Venturers that have contributed significantly to natural resource conservation and environmental protection.

Requirements

These are requirements that all Venturing Hornaday Silver Medal candidates must complete:

- Complete the Conservation core requirement plus the Ecology and Plants & Animals elective requirements for the Venturing Ranger Award.
- Plan, lead, and carry out at least four significant projects in natural resource conservation or environmental improvements, one each from four of the eight different project categories:

Energy conservation, soil and water conservation, fish and wildlife management, forestry and range management, air and water pollution control, resource recovery (recycling), hazardous material disposal, and management and invasive species control.

- Complete an application and provide extensive supporting materials and documentation.
- Be approved by the National Conservation Committee after a local Council review and approval.

QUARTERMASTER AWARD

The Quartermaster Award is the highest rank in Sea Scouts and is as important as the Eagle Scout award. The award identifies the young adult who has the desire and strength to achieve excellence. It represents fulfillment, and is the result of the determination to reach goals in spite of difficulties along the way.

Significance

The award is a reminder that as a ship needs a rudder, a compass, and a moving force to reach its destination, so an individual must be physically strong, mentally awake, and morally straight to achieve worthwhile goals in life.

Requirements

These are requirements that all Quartermaster candidates must complete:

- Be active in the Ship for at least eighteen months.
- Lead a discussion on the subject participating citizenship; write a paper about what the ship can do to contribute to the world fellowship of Scouting; present a brief talk or program on Sea Scouting to a service club; religious organization, PTA, or other adult organization.
- Demonstrate expert level skills and teach those skills to others in the following subjects: Boats, Marlinspike Seamanship, Ground Tackle, Piloting, Signaling,
- Cruising, Safety, Rules of the Road.
 Meet the requirements for BSA or Red Cross Lifeguard; take command of a vessel with a crew of not less than four Sea Scouts for at least 48 hours.
- Complete the requirements for at least four of the electives: Sailing, Engines, Radio, Boat Maintenance, Electricity, Navigation, Drill, Piloting, Yacht Racing, Rigging.
- While an Able Scout, plan, develop, and give leadership to others in a service project helpful to any religious institution, any school, or the community.
- Successfully complete a Council-level Quartermaster board of review.

Staring at the blank page before you Open up the dirty window Let the sun illuminate the words that you could not find



The Value of Leadership

The heart and soul of what we do in the Boy Scouts of America is produce leaders for tomorrow. One of our strengths is shaping leaders who have a strong foundation of values and who know how to serve others, and we have had 100 years of practice. The purpose of the National Youth Leadership Society is to recognize youth members of the BSA who have learned and practiced outstanding leadership skills—the elite of our program.

As a national honor society, the National Youth Leadership Society calls upon local councils to nominate individuals who meet certain criteria. Upon acceptance, the National Court of Honor will offer the individual the honor of membership into the Society.

The National Court of Honor maintains a national honor roll of inducted Society members as a class each calendar year. Individuals will be able to say they are a member of a particular class, for instance, the class of 2010 for members inducted in 2010. The class is based on when the individual was approved, not when the induction took place.

Qualifications

Only those youths who have successfully completed qualifying leadership development courses and performed eligible leadership roles may be nominated for induction to the National Youth Leadership Society. Qualifications for nomination include:

- Complete at least one local unit leadership development course.
- Complete at least three Council and National level leadership development courses.
- Demonstrate significant leadership in the Unit, District, Council, Area or Region.
- Show evidence of other leadership including positions held outside of Scouting (like student body officer, etc.)
